



Sixties Scoop

Between 1965 and 1984 the government, then known in our province as Alberta Social Services, removed children from their homes to place them into the non-indigenous care of foster homes; this is what is now known as the “Sixties Scoop”. As a result, the children were separated from family members and directly creating a loss to their cultural identity, connections and traditions.

On Tuesday, February 14, 2017 an Ontario judge ruled that Canada breached its “duty of care” to the apprehended children throughout this time. The ruling paves the way for an assessment of damages the government will now have to pay. Along with the Survivors of the Residential School System, the Sixties Scoop have been voicing their experiences such as; physical, spiritual, sexual and psychological abuse, loss of culture, loss of identity, loss of belonging to their biological families as this battle has been fought in the courts for many years.

Many from the Piikani Nation community were affected and many have been, and are now coming forward, to call upon both the provincial and federal governments for a shared responsibility of reconciliation. Indigenous Affairs Minister Carolyn Bennett said on Tuesday February 14, the government would “absolutely not” appeal the ruling, but would push to settle on monetary compensation out of court.

Piikani Nation Media sat down with Piikani Nation member Patsy English who recalled “an overwhelming sense of culture shock, fear, survival to be child at that time whereby in these foster homes, you are taught and forced to alienate yourselves from your communities in all manners”. The Appropriation of Indigenous Culture

comment. The problem is that Joseph Boyden is not Indigenous and does not have any First Nation membership in North America.

Aboriginal Peoples Television Network (APTN) National News reporter Jorge Barrera broke the story in late December 2016 claiming that there is no evidence to support the claim from Boyden that he has any Indigenous ancestry and should not be called upon when the media is discussing Indigenous issues. Boyden has since responded, but still left a great deal of uncertainty as to his Indigenous heritage.

Joseph Boyden is a Canadian author who has penned several books in the past few years, some of whom have gained the author national and international attention earning awards and prizes for his work. Most of Boyden's writing and subject matter involves First Nation historic and/or contemporary issues. As a result of critical acclaim, success and notoriety of his published works and their Indigenous subject matter, whenever Indigenous matters have come up in the media in the past few years, Boyden was called upon for insight, perspective and

Appropriation is when an outsider represents members or aspects of another culture. In this case appropriation took place where Boyden was "speaking for" or representing the identity of that community to which he has no blood or ancestral belonging. There are blatant, clear-cut, incidences such as Boyden where he has outright denied an Indigenous person from receiving an award meant to go to an Indigenous person, but there are also cases where these lines become harder to identify.

John Wort Hannam, who was born in the United Kingdom but currently lives in Southern Alberta, released a song in late 2015 called "Man of God". In the song he writes in "first-person", or as a Blackfoot person, about being a residential school survivor. Most would say, it is just a song, right? Both Boyden and Hannam received monetary gain from their art forms utilizing Indigenous identity; monies, that most would argue, would have better gone to an Indigenous artist. The Galt Museum in Lethbridge Alberta,

is now featuring an exhibit running until April 30 entitled "Pianos to Power Chords", where Piikani Nation member Ira Provost is challenging Hannam and his song through an article he wrote called "A Blackfoot View of Blackfoot Cultural Appropriation: a position paper".

Indigenous communities have stood idly by for generations as the North American Settler culture has dominated, and at times even sought to own, thus controlling, the Indigenous culture. Other blatant examples of appropriation to Indigenous cultures are the recreational use of headdresses at festivals and nightclubs, stealing of sacred designs for high fashion non-indigenous designers, the New Age Movement and the selling of Native Halloween costumes.

Indigenous people have the intellect, talent, skill and determination to write books, teach correct culture, and to build communities from the ground up that accurately represent who they are and their place in modern society. We only need to continue to nurture our young Blackfoot students and empower their minds to make the best decisions for our collective future.



POINT

John Wort Hannam is a long-time Fort Macleod resident who spent many years teaching public schools on the Kainai (Blood) reserve. He left teaching to follow his dream of playing music for a living and has since built a musical career that includes a Juno award nomination.

After reading author Edmund Morrissey's book up close then describing his experience in the residential school system, Hannam was moved to write the song "Man of God". Hannam contacted Morrissey about singing his story, and then began publicly performing the song that addresses the horrors of residential schools.

COUNTERPOINT

Ira Provost is from the Piikani (Pikuni) Nation and an active ceremonialist in his Blackfoot traditions. Now pursuing a master's degree studying the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, he was a decade he was a public school district administrator of Aboriginal education while writing, recording and performing his own original music.

When he heard Hannam's song, Provost was prompted to write a position paper titled "A Blackfoot View of Blackfoot Cultural Appropriation." In it, he states, "...first-hand experience in residential schools could only be spoken about from those who attended..." He then wrote the song "Don't Speak For Me".



"I wanted to choose a career where every day is different and I wouldn't be crammed in an office all day long. I also had huge interest in media, social media, music, movies and the ins and outs of the entertainment business. When it came to decide a career path, I figured communications and media was a great way to put both of them together", said Plain Eagle.

Through her studies and experience Plain Eagle learned that the media is not a glamorous industry, it takes a lot of hard work and determination. She

developed an interest of telling First Nation stories or telling stories herself that showcase the Indigenous culture. As a Piikani Nation member, Plain Eagle has that opportunity to tell stories from First Nations perspective where in stories and news items that cover First Nations interest Plain Eagle believes she can relate to the story better than another reporter who does not come from First Nations community.

At the moment Tawnya is writing for the Calgary Journal and has also provided freelance articles for the student paper at Mount Royal University, The Reflector. She also producing and hosting The Community Producers, a community show broadcasted on Shaw TV in Calgary which is made up of segments produced by staff reporters as well as other reporters in Calgary.

"My advice I would give future journalist is to work hard and don't be afraid to chase after what you want. I've learned

that no one is going to hand you opportunities; you have to go out and find them yourself. Journalism is a career where you have to work and if people/employers see that determination in you, and have a higher chance of getting what you want", remarks Plain Eagle.

Oki Piikani,

On behalf of the Piikani Nation Chief and Council, I sincerely wish you a wonderful upcoming spring! I want to also extend a heart-filled Thank You to the staff and volunteers who assisted with the Piikani Nation distribution, without whom it would not have been possible.

At the Chief and Council level, we have been working and establishing partnerships with multiple stakeholders to better assist our projects for the benefit of all the Piikani Nation Membership.

We are currently working with the Alberta Government through meetings with Premier Rachel Notley, Minister Shannon Phillips, Minister Richard Feehan and their teams to develop a working plan that will protect our traditional territory including their recent developments regarding the Castle Mountain area. Discussions have included a traditional Blackfoot designation to which we anticipate a formal naming and ceremony sometime in March 2017. Other discussions include how we can best collectively protect the Castle Mountain area through tourism and employment while maintaining, through preservation, the historic and cultural integrity of the Piikani to the land and the water. It is extremely important that we remind our neighbours at every opportunity that, we as Piikani have never surrendered the land.

Presently our legal team at Gowlings WGL, and the committee members of the Monsel Claim are working with Canada and agronomists to discuss the next steps of the claim; these discussions will determine the appropriate compensation acceptable to the Piikani Nation.

This current fiscal year is coming to an end and our financial team is working throughout the Nation's entities and Corporations to prepare for the upcoming audit season.

Our Nation was honoured as Napi Elementary and Piikani Nation Secondary School hosted former Prime Minister Paul Martin on Monday, February 13th. Our schools were chosen to be one of six First Nations in Canada to receive support from the Paul Martin Family Initiative. This Initiative will provide additional funding to increase support for the education, health and wellbeing of our children in our community schools. Congratulations to the schools, the networking teams throughout the community and the Paul Martin Family Initiative for making this possible. Investing in our children today will have lasting impacts for our future leaders.

There has been steady progress with the development of a New Travel Center, and various renewable energy options for the Piikani Nation. We are also working closely with Piikani Traditional Knowledge Services on the completion of the F.E.I.A reports. On February 20, we officially Opened the New Six-plex.

We send warm wishes to you and your families and will continue working for you, the Piikani Nation.


HEALTHY LIVING

Board of Director Profile - of Piikani Resource Development Ltd.

Doane Crow Shoe, President of Piikani Resource Development Ltd., was first elected to the Piikani Nation Council in January 2007, and is continuing in his third term as Councillor. Doane works with the Chief and Council towards a goal of advancing resource development projects and economic opportunities for the Piikani Nation.

Doane's governance and over-site has seen the completion and implementation of Piikani Oldman Hydro Limited Partnership (POHLP) which has a 25% equity purchase through ATCO's 16MW Hydro Electric Facility. Doane has also finalized negotiations for the development of PiikaniLink a 51% equity purchase of the 240KV transmission assets through the Piikani Nation in partnership with Altalink. The work of Doane and the team that shared his economic vision resulted with the introduction and installation of 26 kW of Solar PV Green Energy on the Piikani Nation, and the refurbishment of the Weather Dancer 900 KW Wind Turbine. Through Doane's goal of responsible resource development, PRDL developed a commercial gravel pit. Doane also oversees the Farming and Ranching component, which installed irrigation pivots and is currently managing a five year expansion plan for CY Ranch. Doane does his best to serve the needs of the

Piikani Nation as a Councillor and as the Piikani Resource Development Ltd. Board President.



THE PEIGAN BOARD OF EDUCATION

It's been an exciting month for the Peigan Board of Education, Piikani Nation Secondary School and Napi's Playground! Aside from the February Family Week break our schools were honoured to have visited a former Prime Minister of Canada!! Prime Minister Paul Martin came to our schools on February 13, to announce that Napi's playground was one of six schools in Canada chosen to receive funding from the Martin Family Initiative!

These monies will go to assisting our students directly in the classroom.

Our schools also hosted a visit with Piikani Elders. In our visit we discussed our Elder's view of education and what their hopes are for our children's future. Our sessions also included a presentation by Karen Crow Shoe who lead discussions on tradition Piikani concepts. During our family week, our staff hosted a Blackfoot Immersion Camp whereby Facilitator's led discussions and groups in practical applications of the Blackfoot language.
